#### **ENRICHMENT GRANTS**

This year, the Foundation has provided **180** enrichment grants for students amounting to **\$548,929** through seven funds that provide grants for young people to attend programs such as summer camps and travel abroad to enrich and transform their lives.

#### IMPACT EXCELLENCE: BUILDING CAPACITY

Four hundred and thirteen participants attended Impact Excellence seminars and other events in 2017. Seventy local nonprofits benefitted by attending one or more of the ten sessions offered this year. The seminars covered a range of topics including Succession Planning, Strategic Partnerships, Using Big Data, Program Evaluation, Story Telling, and Enhancing your Volunteer Program. Two Board Boot Camps were scheduled for 2017, one targeted for Board members with up to 3 years of nonprofit Board experience and an advanced session for Board members with more than 3 years of nonprofit Board experience. Additionally, the Foundation in partnership with the West Cook YMCA, Oak Park Public Library, Housing Forward, Symphony of Oak Park and River Forest, Ten Thousand Villages and Triton College conducted a volunteer recruitment event which was attended by 44 nonprofits seeking volunteers and 320 people who came to explore the many and varied volunteer opportunities.

Furthermore, the Foundation provided the following 4 local nonprofits with technical assistance and consulting support in 2017/2018 to calculate their Social Return on Investment to help them determine and articulate the broader value of their impact, beyond what is usually captured in outcomes and financial terms:

#### **COMMUNITY GRANTS**

#### **Accion Chicago**

\$5,000

Accion provides capital solutions and one-on-one coaching to minority and low-income entrepreneurs who generate jobs and economic growth. This grant supports networking and business coaching for 150 entrepreneurs in our community.

#### **Alliance to End Homelessness**

\$10,000

This grant supports the region-wide system to standardize and expedite the process by which people in need access shelter, housing and homelessness resources.

#### Children's Research Triangle

\$5,000

Children's Research Triangle addresses the mental health needs of high-risk children presenting immediate risk factors, including physical, sexual and emotional abuse; neglect, exposure to violence; prenatal and environmental substance exposure. This grant allows CRT to expand its Traume Treatment Program in Schools in the Austin community.

#### Collaboration for Early Childhood \*\*

\$6,000

This grant will help Early Childhood Education home-based and center providers implement the Project Approach early learning curriculum.

#### CommunityHealth\*\*

\$6,000

This grant will allow CommunityHealth to serve 10,000 patients who are low-income and uninsured in Oak Park, River Forest, and nearby communities.

#### Hephzibah Children's Association\*\*

\$7,000

Hephzibah provides housing and support services primarily to lower income and at risk children and families. This grant will support improvements in Hephzibah's data collection, analysis and reporting.

#### **Housing Forward\***

\$6,000

This grant will address key employment barriers and increase job readiness/employability for 180 clients who are homeless or at-risk of homelessness.

#### IWS The Children's Clinic\*\*

\$5,000

This grant will improve access to mental health care for low-income children through the integration of mental health and medical services.

#### **Lutheran Child and Family Services \***

\$6000

This organization works to improve the well-being of youth, adults, families. This grant will help 30 foster care youth who identify as LGBT achieve permanency with a foster parent/family.

#### Mujeres Latinas en Accion\*\*

\$5,000

This grant will provide comprehensive bilingual/bicultural services to Spanish speaking victims of domestic violence and their children.

#### New Moms, Inc.\*

\$5,000

This grant is for the Family Support Program, serving high-risk young mothers (ages 13-24) by providing home-based parent mentoring, doulas and weekly parent support groups.

#### Oak Park Art League\*\*

\$5,000

This capacity building grant will help OPAL redefine its mission and programming so as to represent a diverse audience and to implement Art for Social Change as a new programatic approach to change.

#### **Oak Park Education Foundation**

\$5,000

This grant will provide scholarships for low-income children so they can attend summer BASE Camp which involves them in hands-on STEAM (science, tech, engineering, arts and math) projects.

#### Oak Park Festival Theatre\*

\$5,000

This general operating grant will help the Theatre more fully engage with a greater diversity of talent on the board and with actors.

#### **OPRF Food Pantry\*\***

\$8,000

This grant for the Emergency Hunger Relief Program provides emergency supplies of high quality, healthy, nutrient-rich food to 50,000 individuals each year.

#### Oak Park-River Forest Day Nursery\*

\$5,000

This general operating grant will ensure that 75 children from our community are well prepared and ready to learn when they transition to Kindergarten, regardless of their ability to pay.

#### **Opportunity Knocks**

\$5000

Opportunity Knocks provides opportunities and resources to young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities so that they may pursue occupational and social interests. This grant will support health and wellness program and increase therapeutic benefits for participants.

#### PCC Community Wellness Center\*\*

\$6,000

This grant will enhance PCC's community urban garden and farm stand in Austin, so that this "Farmacy" can be used to enhance the clinic's health education efforts to combat chronic diseases like diabetes.

#### Pro Bono Network\*\*

\$5,000

Pro Bono Network increases access to legal aid services for low-income residents by removing hurdles for attorneys to provide provide pro bono representation. This grant will increase capacity in orders of protection, juvenile expungement program, and senior clinic work.

#### Sarah's Inn\*\*

\$8,000

Sarah's Inn improves lives of those affected by domestic violence and breaks the cycle of violence for future generations. This grant supports the Counseling Program.

#### **Smart Love Family Services**

\$10,000

This grant will allow Smart Love to recruit and train therapists of color, as their client base are primarily people of color to enhance staff capacity and cultural competency.

#### Symphony of Oak Park & River Forest

\$5,000

This general operating grant will increase engagement across major age groups and ethnicities, broaden financial support, and increase collaboration with community agencies.

#### United Way of Metropolitan Chicago,

#### **West Suburban Regional**

\$13,500

Supports the Live 2020 Campaign, a community impact plan for Chicagoland and western suburbs.

#### West Cook YMCA\*

\$5,000

This grant supports the Single Room Occupancy (SRO) residents program which is key to the Y's social responsibility and addresses the local need of affordable housing.

#### **West Suburban Special Recreation Association**

\$5,000

This grant will provide improvements to its web-based technology and capacity, such as, for the first time, allowing online program registration. WSSRA provides community-based theraputic recreation services for individuals of all ages with disabilities.

#### ENTREPRENEUR LEADERS IN PHILANTHROPY: BIG IDEA

#### **Rescue Foundation**

\$50,000

To expand this unique program that reduces return rate to prison (recidivism) of former inmates by interrupting the cycle of events that leads to recidivism and transforms people from being a burden on public funds (prosecution, imprisonment, and welfare), to law-abiding, tax-paying contributors within local economies. This grant is to expand the employer and employee training/support curriculum.

#### **Opportunity Knocks**

\$2,000

Grant to build capacity of professional staff who will become a Certified Inclusive Fitness Trainer (CIFT) through the American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM).

#### **Leadership Lab**

\$25,000

Leadership Lab's goal is to create stronger, more engaged leaders who will ensure that Oak Park-River Forest, and surrounding communities, are desirable places to live and work. This general operating grant will support the implementation of activities that contribute towards Leadership Lab's goal and outcomes.

#### PlanItGreen/Seven Generations Ahead

\$89,898
